Jones is a Labor and Delivery Registered Nurse (RN) in the Women and Children's Services Department at Sparrow Main Hospital in Lansing, where she was honored in May as the 2017 Nurse of the Year. After her first year, Jones determined that Ferris's program was not the right fit for her at the time and she transferred to an online program with the University of Phoenix, where she completed her BSN in May 2017.

Iones said she found her niche when she transferred to labor and delivery in April 2014.
