General Description: Montcalm Community College is seeking candidates to teach part-time in Sociology.

SOCI 230 (Sociology)- This course familiarizes beginning students with the basic concepts and methods used by sociologists to study society. It includes culture, social structure, social class, institutions, deviance and social change emphasizing the application of the sociological perspective in analyzing society and human behavior.

SOCI 235 (Social Problems)- This course focuses on the sociological approach to social problems including mental illness, crime, poverty, family and community disintegration, violence ecology, and current events.

Qualifications:

1. Master’s degree from a regionally accredited university with a minimum of 18 graduate credit hours in the discipline
2. Previous teaching experience preferred but not required
3. Commitment to community college philosophy
4. Understanding of and experience with technology as a learning tool, both within and outside the classroom

REMUNERATION:	Beginning pay rate for adjunct faculty is \$673.67 per contact hour taught. Part-time faculty may take one class per semester tuition free (must be used in the semester in which they teach or the semester immediately following) MCC will pay adjunct instructors’ mileage up to 70 miles round trip at the current IRS mileage rate. This is based on 50 miles one-way, with no mileage being paid for the first 30 miles round trip.
